Max Carol Rash, a beloved husband, father, grandfather, great-grandfather, and friend, passed away peacefully, on December 28, 2025, at the age of 83. He was born on August 12, 1942, in Mildred, Texas, to Blanche Viola and Charlie Luel Rash. Max lived a life filled with love, faith, and dedication, which he shared with those fortunate enough to know him.

Max was a proud graduate of Mildred High School, class of 1960. After surrendering to the ministry, he became a well-respected biblical scholar and Bible teacher, known for his wisdom and understanding. His thirst for knowledge led him to attend Navarro College, Christ for the Nations Institute in Dallas, Southwestern Assemblies of God University (SAGU), where he ultimately earned his master's degree in Counseling.
