He was the funniest guy I ever met and we did a lot of comedic stuff together. We were extras in a movie together on his birthday when I first moved to California. We had a silk screen business at one time and used to sing Delta Dawn at the top of our lungs during the long hot days in the garage. We worked at a theme restaurant in orange country and had a lot of fun there, producing an annual high school year book type book for the waiters. We also sang in the employee talent show as an Indian duet act "The Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever Tick Indian Dancers" and sang a lounge medley of "Cherokee People". I remember being in Corsicana with him and he was explaining how the Pizza Hut was where the Duncan Donuts used to be and how Duncan Donuts moved to where KFC was and KFC moved to ...etc. And the funniest thing in Corsicana was how his father had an entire garage full of a home security product that he designed that instead of using a key pad, used a rotary dial.

We were apartment managers together in Los Angeles and used to play monopoly on the roof. Scott called one of the buildings "Murder Town" and one building "Burgler Town" for obvious reasons. He renamed the marquee on one of the buildings the "Gnarly Dude" Apartments and had the tenants in an uproar.

He could make the biggest celebrity, the most pretentious woman, a big CEO, or the meanest guy in the room like him with one small poignant joke at their expense. One thing I really liked about Scott was that he never altered his personality for anyone.

He taught me a lot about comedy and got me started designing my own greeting cards, which I've done now since 1988.

I always wished he would have channelled his brilliance into something productive. The problem was that everything was too

easy for him and he always became bored quickly.

If he truly is gone, it honestly won't seem like it, because I usually find myself laughing once a day remembering something he did. Practically every day I say to my husband something like, "This one time, Scott and I were working at a restaurant and the really really mean x-marine boss named "Bob" was lurking around being a jerk and harrasing everyone, and the sound guy was playing the soundtrack of "Beauty and the Beast". Everyone was being yelled at while we tried to turn the room over as quickly as possible. The song "Kill The Beast" came on over the loudspeaker and Scott yelled out, "RUN BOB!" I still laugh whenever I remember that time and many many many others.
